



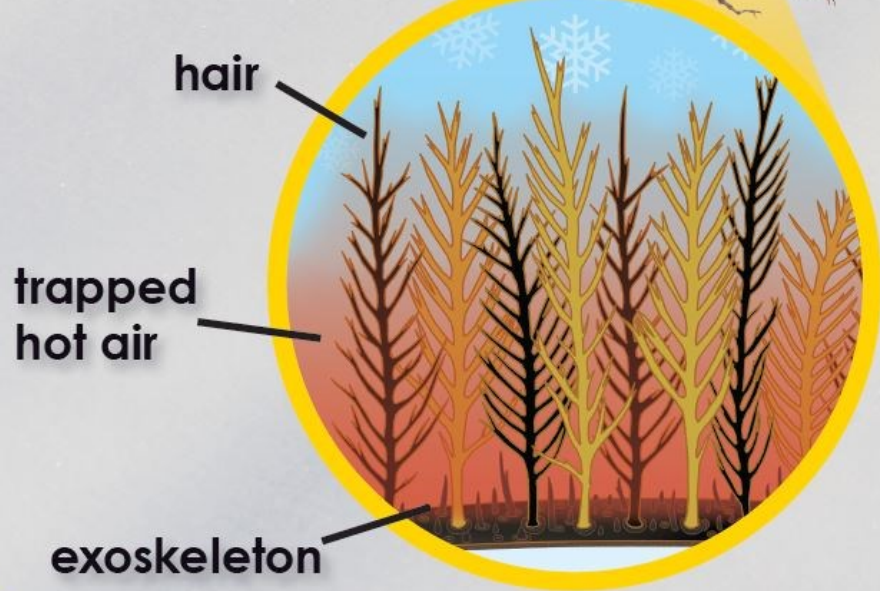
# Snow Queen
